The Coastal First Nations - Great Bear Initiative (CFN-GBI) 2021-2026 Strategic Plan presents the Vision and Mission of the organization. This plan includes five highlevel goals and a series of objectives for each. This plan will guide the work of the organization over the next 5+ years.

About the Plan

This strategic plan was developed under the direction of the CFN-GBI Board of Directors with input from Staff, Program Managers, and Stewardship Directors. The plan came together piece-by-piece through an iterative process over the course of many virtual planning sessions, meetings, and one-on-one conversations, as well as through questionnaires and worksheets.

This plan provides a path forward for CFN-GBI over a period of 5+ years. The "+" has been included to indicate that the work carried out over the next five years will continue past that timeframe as we strive to achieve our long-term vision.

The plan includes a vision, an updated mission, and five high-level goals to guide the work of the organization. Each goal is supported by three to five objectives that will guide us in helping to achieve our goals.



Introduction

In June of 2000, leaders from British Columbia's North and Central Coast and Haida Gwaii joined together to sign the Declaration of First Nations of the North Pacific Coast.

The Declaration, amended and re-affirmed in March 2021, contains important commitments that outline how we work together. Through the signing of the Declaration, a coast-wide alliance was born. Today, over twenty years later, we remain committed to the Declaration, and to our alliance. Through this recent strategic planning process, we took time to pause and look inward; to celebrate the incredible and ground-breaking accomplishments we have achieved over the past twenty years, and to determine how we want to continue working together to ensure many more years of success.

About Coastal First Nations - Great Bear Initiative

Coastal First Nations - Great Bear Initiative (CFN-GBI) is a unique alliance of Nations: Wuikinuxv, Heiltsuk, Kitasoo/Xaixais, Nuxalk, Gitga'at, Metlakatla, Old Massett, Skidegate, Council of the Haida Nation, and Gitxaala. Each Nation has its own distinct culture, governance and territory located on British Columbia's North and Central Coast and Haida Gwaii. Based on the inherent rights and leadership of these member Nations, CFN-GBI promotes community self-sufficiency and sustainable economic development. Together, we work to uphold our responsibility to support the wellbeing of our communities, and to protect the lands, waters, air, and all living species in our territories.

Our Organization and Plans


Coastal First Nations - Great Bear Initiative is governed by a Board of Directors composed of one representative from each of the ten member Nations. These leaders meet multiple times per year to provide direction and guidance on high-level goals and activities. The Executive Committee is a smaller group of leaders who meet regularly to review administrative issues and monitor project work.

CFN-GBI has a small core staff who support the Board in carrying out planning work, communications, project support, and administration. Project managers work in conjunction with staff to oversee and direct the work of CFN-GBI's many diverse programs and projects that aim to protect these unique and important territories, from seafloor to mountain top.

The Great Bear Rainforest is made up of 74,000 kilometers of rainforest and sea, stretching north to the Alaskan border and as far south as Vancouver Island. This region is made up of the unceded Traditional Territories of over two dozen First Nations who have been carefully stewarding these lands and waters for millennia.

Our Planning Context

This strategic plan exists within the broader planning ecosystem of CFN-GBI, as depicted in the graphic below. Each plan aligns with the others, and varies in depth and detail.



Our Accomplishments

Coastal First Nations - Great Bear Initiative has accomplished an incredible amount in the past twenty years since the signing of the Declaration that first brought us together. Declaration of First Nations of the North Pacific Coast

DECLARATION

The North West Coast is a rich, and precious part of the earth. Our Cultures arise from the connection of our people with these lands and seas.

We recognize that our life source remains under the direct threat of industry and from the cumulative impacts of humanity and attendant effects on the climate.

This declaration is our commitment to protecting and restoring the natural world and in doing so, retaining our cultures while designing sustainable economies.

We live with the consequence of any abuse of our territories and the greater perils of climate change.

We commit ourselves to stand together, support each other and work together to fulfill these commitments:

- To making decisions that ensure the well-being of <u>our lands</u> and <u>waters</u>.
- To retain our cultures through our tradition, knowledge, and respect of nature.
- To be respectful of each other and to all life.

PRINCIPLES

We recognize our responsibilities to future generations;

We will advance our influence through the affirmation of our Title and Rights;

Our respect for nature will continue to guide our decisions;

We seek self-reliance and will design our economies to respect our life source;

We will share our experiences and support each other to mutual advantage;

We will respect territorial prerogatives and develop protocols to formalize interplay;

Our Nations will celebrate our cultural differences while honoring our family ties.






Our Vision

Our Board Members are empowered and supported to articulate our organizational values, set the direction of the organization and act as informed spokespeople for CFN-GBI within their own communities.

We support member Nations' resilience and independence by supporting mitigation of, preparation for, and adaptation to the impacts of climate change.

OBJECTIVE 2.4

We support member Nations in rebuilding sustainable fisheries and forestry.

Our work supports the wellbeing of our member Nations.

OBJECTIVE 3.1

We provide opportunities for support, training, education, and employment within member Nations.

OBJECTIVE 3.2

We support conservation-based economic development in communities.

OBJECTIVE 3.3

We support the communications and connectivity capacity of member Nations.

OBJECTIVE 3.4

We measure the impacts of CFN-GBI on member Nations' wellbeing.

OBJECTIVE 3.5

We collaborate with, and provide guidance to other Indigenous Nations, organizations, and international groups whose work aligns with ours, and impacts shared territories.

Our clear organizational structure, roles, and responsibilities ensure effective collaboration across CFN-GBI programs, projects, and subregional organizations.


OBJECTIVE 5.3
