Funding Opportunities for Indigenous Communities

The <u>BC Community Climate Funding Guide</u> and the <u>Funding Finder Tool</u> are online resources for those searching for project funding with grants and programs (from under \$100,000 to over \$1,000,000).

CEDR Funding: 3 Streams

What? New Relationship Trust has announced the 3rd intake is open for the following 3 funding streams for their Community Energy Diesel Reduction (CEDR) program:

- Renewable Energy Generation (REG) provides major project development support for renewable electricity generation capital projects;
- Community Energy Planning (CEP) supports remote communities in the development, maintenance and management of a Community Energy Plan;
- Demand Side Management (DSM)
 provides support to remote
 communities to undertake capital
 improvements and retrofits that
 upgrade premises such as residential
 and community buildings that results
 in improved energy efficiency and load
 management.

When? REG applications are due July 15, 2024 and CEP + DSM applications are due November 29, 2024 or when funding is exhausted.



Energy Innovation Program – Renewable Energy Demonstration: Stream 2

What? The federal government's Office of Energy Research and Development will fund <u>demonstration projects</u> that will help advance innovative renewable heat or power generation and/or integration through novel applications that provide local benefits. Renewable resources are

limited to solar, wind, geothermal and marine energy for this fund. Stream 2 funds up to 100% of total project cost for projects by Indigenous applicants that request between \$500,000 and \$4,000,000 over a period of up to a maximum of five years. Indigenous applicants are encouraged to contact the Program to be connected with project officer (eiprenewablespierenouvelables@nrcan-rncan.gc.ca) who through will provide support application process, including verifying eligibility.

When? Indigenous applicants have until **September 26, 2024** to submit an Expression of Interest application with projects being selected in summer 2025.

Indigenous Leadership Fund

What? The Low Carbon Economy Fund has developed a program to support projects that are Indigenous-owned and led; advance Indigenous climate leadership; and support the self-determined climate, social, and economic priorities Indigenous peoples. Projects must be ready for deployment or construction and meet the following criteria: incorporate or make use of renewable energy, energy efficiency, low-carbon or technologies and practices; offer broader environmental, social, and economic benefits; and use proven technologies and practices (proven technologies usually correspond with a level 8 or above on the Technology Readiness Level Scale). In the First Nations funding stream the Fund can cover up to \$6 million per project.

When? If interested, applicants can email LeadershipAutochtoneFEFEC-IndigenousLeadershipLCEF@ec.gc.ca to receive Eligibility Criteria and the Expression of Interest form. Applications will be reviewed on an ongoing basis until funding is allocated.

What? When and how? Happening June 19 at 10am (virtual), register here.


Indigenous Climate Monitoring Toolkit

What? The **First Peoples Group** created an <u>Indigenous Climate Monitoring Toolkit</u> that has three main components:

- step-by-step guidance for planning, designing and implementing community-based monitoring projects;
- examples and stories from Indigenous communities and organizations who have implemented community-based climate monitoring projects;
- key resources related to climate monitoring and adaptation

Climate Ready BC

What? ClimateReadyBC is an online platform to be used as a disaster and climate risk reduction tool for public and community use. It will continue to evolve through engagement with First Nations, local governments, and other partners. Currently there are mapping tools, data and information available by hazard (floods, wildfires, etc.) as well as a resource catalogue search tool (screenshot below).




News and Media

Indigenous-led Marine Protected and Conserved Areas







Settler-introduced commercial fishing, shipping and industrialization have come to endanger aquatic ecosystems that are critical to our survival. Indigenous-led conservation areas are being established across the country to combat the impact colonization has had on oceans, lakes and rivers, and return these critical habitats to their original caretakers.
