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
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Times Spent Together

Funding Opportunities for Indigenous Communities

BC Parks Foundation: BC Conservation Fund

What? The BC Parks Foundation is accepting Expressions of Interest for <u>Stream 1 Funding (Area-Based Conservation Initiatives)</u>. This funding stream includes phases/projects that are focused on securing a community mandate, conservation planning and agreements, or long-term stewardship and restoration of new conservation areas. The amount of funding given will vary depending on the funding stream and phase; however, they anticipate smaller, more community-based initiatives will tend to range up to <u>\$100,000</u>, whereas more complex, multi-year projects will likely range up to <u>\$250,000</u>.

When? Expressions of Interest (EoI) are due July 4, 2025 and following that submission the Fund will advise EoI applicants to submit a full application in early September.

What? Indigenous Services Canada has a Climate Change and Health Adaptation Program with a Stream for First Nations South of 60°N (Nations within BC qualify). The program supports projects that focus on the health impacts of climate change with some possible areas of adaptation and research being: food security and access to traditional foods; engagement and knowledge transfer between Elders and youth; emergency preparedness; safety while on the land; and mental health impacts of climate change. In previous years, the program has provided up to \$125,000 per project, with recipients having up to two years to complete the project. When? The deadline to submit a proposal is **September 12th, 2025**.

New Relationship Trust: Nation Building Grant

What? New Relationship Trust has a <u>Nation Building Grant</u> that offers either a 1 year grant of up to \$60,000 or a 2 year grant of up to \$120,000 for projects and activities focused on strengthening the institutional, governance and community capacities in reclaiming and rebuilding resiliency, self-determination and sovereignty within each Nation's context. Some example projects include habitat restoration and environmental feasibility studies; commercial development and business acquisition plans; and land use, strategic, community energy and economic development plans. When? Applicants have until December 5th, 2025 (or until funds are exhausted).

- Coast Funds has <u>updated their list of current funding opportunities</u> and grants to support First Nations' projects for the summer.

Events, Training and Resources

<u>FNHES Learning Lab: Climate Resilient Retrofits - Planning for Multiple Hazards</u>

What? Fraser Basin Council's First Nations Home EnergySave is hosting a virtual Learning Lab on a new tool called the Climate Resilient Retrofits Database, with guest speakers from the creators Partners for Action and the National Research Council Canada. Participants will get a chance to try out the database and learn how to use it to help decision making about retrofitting community buildings for multiple climate hazards and improving energy efficiency.



Indigenous Perspectives Roundtables

What? The virtual Indigenous Perspectives roundtable is hosted every year in partnership with the Centre for Indigenous Environmental Resources and it brings together over 1,000 people to share and reflect on Indigenous-led research and knowledges on climate issues.

There are two roundtables with the following topics:

- Indigenous Ways of Knowing as Climate Policy on June 18
 - Discussion of 3 case studies that highlight why Indigenous governance approaches and worldviews are essential for more effective climate adaptation and mitigation policies
- Indigenous Power as the Pathway to Clean Electricity on June 19
 - Exploring the necessity and potential of expanded Indigenous participation in the development, delivery, and security of clean electricity

National Indigenous Peoples Day, overlapping with the Summer Solstice this year, is a day to celebrate, recognize and uplift the cultures and traditions of First Nations, Inuit and Métis Peoples. For those who are non-Indigenous, we encourage you to connect to the land and learn more about those who have been its caretakers for centuries/since time immemorial.

First Nations Guide to Emergency Management Self-Resiliency

What? The First Nations Guide to Emergency Management Self-Resiliency was created by Indigenous Youth Interns and the Ministry of Emergency Management

and Climate Readiness, who produced the Guide by collecting input and feedback from communities, partnership tables, and the provincial government. The Guide is meant to provide an introduction to emergency management, hazard-specific terminology, fact sheets and contact information. It is intended for use by Emergency Program Coordinators or those that oversee and coordinate emergency planning efforts at the community level. "Indigenous Utilities: The building of Indigenous-owned electrical utilities in Canada" Report

What? The First Nations Major Project Coalition (FNMPC) has released a report looking at Indigenous-owned utilities in both Canada and the US. The report explores why Indigenous nations may want to form a utility, a range of possible utility models and what the barriers, challenges and risks may be. It gives recommendations for governments, utilities and regulators, as well as recommendations for Nations.

News and Media

Bills 14 and 15 now law, despite First Nations leaders opposition

Bill 14 (Renewable Energy Projects - Streamlined Permitting Act) and Bill 15 (Infrastructure Projects Act) were both rushed through the legislature the first week of June, despite many concerns on their impact to First Nations' Rights and Title. Backlash to Bill 15 has been building since it was first introduced in the legislature on May 1. While the bill has been claimed to "reduce delays for urgently needed projects" like schools and hospitals, many cite that the lack of consultation and environmental protections work against advancing Reconciliation. Chief Don Tom of the Tsartlip First Nation said First Nations will do everything in their legal power to challenge the bills in court.

What to Watch: Indigenous History and Pride Month

With June being both Pride Month and National Indigenous History Month, we're highlighting shows and movies that explore Indigenous 2SLGBTQIA+ experiences. imagineNATIVE Film and Media Arts Festival has an online festival happening June 9-15th, with movies like *Inkwo for When the Starving Return, Aviliag (Entwined)*, and the compilation of short films *Rainbow Shorts* that you can watch online for \$6. The <u>National Film Board of Canada</u> is also releasing films for Indigenous History Month - watch <u>My Friend the Green Horse</u> by Abenaki American-Canadian filmmaker Alanis Obomsawin, <u>Northlore</u> animated by Dene artist Casey Koyczan or <u>First Stories</u> - <u>Two Spirited</u>.

Most of the Network attended Pembina's Renewables in Remote Communities conference late March in beautiful Whitehorse, Yukon on the shared traditional territory of Kwanlin Dün First Nation and Ta'an Kwäch'än Council. Network staff and CACs Daniel Cupples (Lhoosk'uz Dene), Garrett Russ (Skidegate) and Kevin Brown (Old Massett) took the opportunity to present on ICAN and their communities. Network Lead Gabriela also sat on a panel discussing "Capacity Building & Empowering Community Involvement in the Clean Energy Transition" with fellow capacity building programs like ICE's 20/20 Catalysts and the Arctic Remote Energy Networks Academy.
